- DAC technical members approving the choice of replacement stone for the copings prior to the commencement of work
- 2. Cadw being notified of the date of commencement and duration of the work

The Reasons for the Grant

- By resolution dated 5th September 2016 the PCC has resolved to support this application for Faculty
- After display of a Notice in Form 2 for 28 days, no objections have been received
- 3. The provisions of the Faculty Procedural Rules have been complied with
- 4. The Diocesan Advisory Committee recommends that this Faculty be granted
- Upon a consideration of the papers it appears just and expedient to grant this Faculty

Under Rule 29(3) the Grant of a Faculty shall be implemented within a period of 5 years from the date hereof, otherwise the Grant shall lapse

The Grant of a Faculty was the formal approval for proceeding with work on the roof

St James' Church is a Grade II* listed building dating from the 12th century. There was major restoration work in the late 19th century and some repair work in the mid-20th century, but there have recently been problems with the roof, the walls and the tower, which have limited the use of the building. There are regular religious services, but the church council wishes to ensure that it remains a safe and welcoming environment and that it serves the needs of the wider community.

As part of a programme of restoration work, during 2017 we have replaced the roof. This report explains what we did.



What we did

- We agreed that the whole roof should be replaced, not just the nave and porch roofs
- We approached several organisations for financial support, almost all of whom responded positively
- We set up a web site at www.wickchurch.wales
- We enlisted the support of our local school in providing material for the site
- We set up a JustGiving page with support from the National Churches Trust
- We accepted the lowest tender for the work, despite this being over our budget
- We agreed with our architect, the diocesan authorities, Cadw and major donors to change the specification of the slates

- We delivered information about the project to every house in the village before work started
- We raised funds through a Tea Party and a Garden Party at a local farm
- We invited people to sponsor a slate and to write something to be discovered in hundreds of years' time when the roof is next repaired
- We celebrated when the work was nearly finished with a service at which the sponsored slates were blessed
- We got the work finished and the scaffolding down days before a long-planned wedding

What went wrong (or not quite right)

- At the first attempt, the scope of the project was too broad and was rejected by possible funders
- When we received an offer of grant, it did not cover everything that we wanted to do
- A top-up grant, which we had hoped would fund the remainder of the work on the roof, only covered a proportion of the cost, so we had to seek further funding
- Tenders for the work proved to be considerably higher than budget, so we had to consider whether the specification of the slates should be revised and how to raise the additional funds
- A proofing error in the flier distributed around the village may have cost us some online donations before corrective action was taken
- Damaged timbers, only discovered when the slates were removed, had to be replaced, but this was within the scope of our budgeted contingency

What we learned

- That we can manage this sort of project
- That we need to be bold and confident in our decisions
- That there are all sorts of people who want to help

What comes next

We hope to continue with restoration work to ensure that the church is a safe and welcoming environment for the regular congregation, the wider community and visitors. Next on our list is repairing the walls and tower. When we are able to do this will depend on funding for the work.

Meanwhile, we are conscious of the need for regular routine maintenance and a maintenance plan has been prepared as a separate document.
